

## PLATE 6.

*Top Row* — "Block and Fan" as this pattern is currently called, was also known as "Block with Fan Border". Originally issued by Richards and Hartley Flint Glass Co. in Tarentum, Pa. around 1885, it was their "No. 554", and was reissued after 1891 by the U.S. Glass Co. It was made largely in clear, of a good grade heavy glass. 1. Water carafe,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. 2. Cream pitcher, pressed handle,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  inches high. 3. Wine,  $3\frac{3}{4}$  inches high. 4. Water pitcher, pressed handle,  $7\frac{3}{4}$  inches high. 5. (In front of water pitcher) sauce dish,  $2\frac{1}{4}$  inches high. 6. Goblet, 6 inches high. 7. Handled decanter, pressed handle has a row of blocks on each side,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. 8. Celery vase, 7 inches high.

*Second Row* — "Daisy and Button" pattern group has been made by practically every glass factory in the United States that was producing tableware at the time this pattern was fashionable. Exhibited at the Philadelphia Centennial of 1876, it has remained a popular favorite and has been widely reproduced. There are many variations, many colors, many items. This ruby-stained variation is called "Daisy and Button with Red Dots". 1. Tumbler, ruby rim,  $3\frac{3}{4}$  inches high. 2. Toothpick holder, scalloped top,  $2\frac{3}{4}$  inches high. 3. Rare form toothpick holder, with scalloped edge bent out and slightly downward,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. 4. Canoe-shaped dish, 4 inches high,  $11\frac{3}{4}$  inches long. 5. Cake stand, 6 inches high,  $10\frac{1}{4}$  inches diameter. 6. Novelty slipper,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches high,  $4\frac{3}{4}$  inches long. 7. Punch cup,  $2\frac{1}{4}$  inches high. 8. Vase, cornucopia held by frosted hand,  $6\frac{1}{4}$  inches high. 9. Small cream pitcher,  $2\frac{3}{4}$  inches high. 10. Small covered sugar, 4 inches high to top of finial.

*Third Row* — This pattern "Royal Crystal" was popular in the late 1880's or early 1890's. It was a good grade of heavy, brilliant glass, made both in clear and ruby-stained, in a variety of pieces. 1. Goblet,  $6\frac{1}{4}$  inches high. 2. Wine, 4 inches high. 3. Rare, square bowl, deep ruby rim,  $3\frac{3}{4}$  inches high,  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches square. 4. Rare cake stand, lower edge of rim serrated, ruby-stained high standard,  $6\frac{1}{4}$  inches high,  $9\frac{1}{4}$  inches diameter. 5. Covered butter dish,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches high to top of finial. 6. Tumbler, 4 inches high. 7. Covered candy jar,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  inches high.

*Bottom Row* — "Royal Crystal" pattern was made in a complete line of table ware. 1. Tankard pitcher,  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. 2. Rectangular bowl,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  inches wide,  $8\frac{1}{4}$  inches long. 3. Syrup jug, pewter top, exceptionally deep color,  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. 4. Covered sugar,  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches high to top of finial. 5. Cream pitcher,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  inches high. 6. Triangular, handled dish, 2 inches high, 6 inches long from handle. 7. Celery vase,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. 8. Syrup jug, pewter top, 6 inches high. 9. Rectangular bowl,  $4\frac{1}{2}$  inches wide, 7 inches long. 10. Bulbous water pitcher,  $9\frac{1}{4}$  inches high.
