

## PLATE 8.

*Top Row* — 1. Decanter, "Currier and Ives" pattern, made by Bellaire Goblet Company of Findlay, Ohio, 13 inches high. This pattern was made in clear or canary usually, and was made in full table settings, including plates. 2. "Kokomo" or "Bar and Diamond", this pattern was made in the late 1880's by Richards and Hartley Flint Glass Company as their "Number 190". The deep ruby bands are sometimes etched. Tumbler, 3½ inches high. 3. Handled carafe, variant with bars swirling to right, 9¾ inches high. 4. Wine, 3¾ inches high. 5. "Bevelled Diamond and Star" syrup pitcher, 7 inches high. Notice the different areas ruby-stained in this piece as compared with the next four pieces. 6. Compote, scalloped top, 7 inches high, 7 inches diameter. 7. Wine, 4 inches high. 8. Decanter, 10¾ inches high. 9. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high.

*Second Row* — "Oregon", made by Richards and Hartley, Tarentum, Pennsylvania in 1888. 1. Spoonholder, 5 inches high. 2. Footed sauce dish, 2¾ inches high, 3¾ inches diameter. 3. Goblet, 6 inches high. 4. Celery vase in "Melrose" pattern, made by Greensburg Glass Company, Greensburg, Pennsylvania and also the Brilliant Glass Works, Brilliant, Ohio, 6 inches high. This pattern was made both plain and etched. 5. "Radiant Daisy and Button" with red button, similar to the "Isis" pattern, butter dish, 5 inches high to top of finial, 7¼ inches diameter. 6. Goblet, 6 inches high. 7. Covered sugar, 6¾ inches high to top of finial.

*Third Row* — This attractive pattern is previously unlisted and unrecorded. Because it has been first presented here, in the collection of Mr. and Mrs. C. Kenneth Vincent, and with its obvious design of a ruby-stained heart on a clear, stippled background, the name of "Vincent Valentine" has been introduced. The maker and list of pieces available is unknown. 1. Cream pitcher, 4¼ inches high. 2. Covered sugar, 6½ inches high to top of finial. 3. Covered butter dish, 5½ inches high, 7½ inches diameter. 4. Water pitcher, 8¼ inches high. 5. Tumbler, 4¼ inches high. 6. Sauce dish, scalloped top, 2 inches high, 4½ inches diameter. 7. Spoonholder, scalloped top, 3½ inches high.

*Bottom Row* — 1. "National Eureka", made by the National Glass Company in 1891. McKee made an "Eureka" also, so maker's name must be used to distinguish the patterns. Water pitcher, serrated scallops, 7¾ inches high. 2. Spoonholder, 4½ inches high. 3. Toothpick holder, 2½ inches high. 4. "Tacoma", made by the Greensburg Glass Company, Greensburg, Pennsylvania in 1894 and the Central Glass Company of Wheeling, West Virginia. Oval bowl, serrated scalloped rim, 6¼ inches wide, 10¼ inches long, 4 inches high. 5. Syrup pitcher, 6½ inches high. 6. Decanter, 11½ inches high. 7. "Prince of Wales Plumes", made in 1900 by the A. H. Heisey Company of Newark, Ohio. Originally it was their "Number 335". Pieces produced after 1906 have the Heisey diamond-shape trademark with the "H" enclosed on the inside base. Cream pitcher, 5¼ inches high. 8. Tankard pitcher, 8¾ inches high. 9. Toothpick holder, 2½ inches high. 10. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high.
