J1—JACOBAN pattern cruet from Czechoslovakia or England with original stopper. The ruby-staining is on the tips of the pattern design

typical "Bohemian" style of staining. The word "Oil" in English indicates it was made for U.S. or British markets. We have evidence of considerable distribution in both markets. The late production period for this pattern tends to rule out its having been decorated by an American decorator on a European blank.

NOTE: This tumbler is probably a circa 1900-05 issue as a souvenir. McKee refers to the design simply as No. 132 Design in our 1902 McKee/National catalogue reprint. Please note that McKee used the name JUBILEE in the same catalogue for the pattern known today as HICKMAN (also known in ruby-stain).
